

# 2024 ACCOMPLISHMENTS



## SLV Wool Pellet Project

In partnership with the CSU Research Farm in Center, Center Conservation District piloted a field study using wool pellets as a soil amendment to increase soil water holding capacity and act as an organic fertilizer. This research is being conducted to find a solution to the SLV water crisis and provide a market for wool.



#### Weed Management Program

The Center Conservation District provides weed management services for primarily List B, List C, and Watch List species in Saguache County with an estimated 230 acres of private and public land treated in 2024.

## **Colorado Soil Health Program**

The Center Conservation District and summer interns worked with 9 producers on 10 fields to initiate conservation practices, install soil moisture probes, conduct soil tests, and provide technical assistance via the Colorado Soil Health Program.

# 2024 ACCOMPLISHMENTS





In partnership with the Rio Grande Conservation District, Center Conservation District leases its jointly-owned farming circle to local producers to test conservation efforts in real, applicable scenarios. This year, potatoes grew on the circle as part of a conservation-cash crop rotation.



### **Tree Planting Activity**

Together with the Rio Grande Conservation District and Colorado State Forest Service, the Center Conservation District invited students from Sargent Schools to our office to learn the importance of trees while planting their own.

## Soil & Water Connection Workshop

The Center Conservation District hosted a Soil & Water Connection Workshop with the Rio Grande Conservation District and guest speaker Annie Overlin to educate producers on this relationship, the 7 missing links of soil health, and soil chromatography.

### Southern Rocky Mountain Ag Conference

The Center Conservation District shared a booth at the Southern Rocky Mountain Ag Conference with Mosca-Hooper CD, Rio Grande CD, and RGWCEI to provide conservation education and promote community outreach.

## San Luis Valley FFA Range Judging

Focusing on growing future generations of conservationists, the Center Conservation District sponsored and participated in the 2024 San Luis Valley FFA Range Judging Competition where 42 students competed in plant identification and site ecology judging.

## - Educational Activities

The Center Conservation District participated in educating future generations of conservationists through ecology field trips partnered with the Rio Grande Watershed Conservation & Education Initiative. Topics included forestry, wildlife habitat, stream systems, and range ecology for 40 students.

## Working Lands Climate Corps

The Center Conservation District was selected by the Colorado State Conservation Board to host full- and part-time Working Lands Climate Corps members to assist with the research and implementation of conservation practices. These members will work with other conservation groups in the SLV throughout 2025 with projects such as the SLV Wool Pellet Project, SLV Revegetation Project, and the Colorado Soil Health Program.

## SLV Wool Pellet Project Continuation

The Center Conservation District and the CSU Research Farm will be continuing the SLV Wool Pellet Project in 2025. The goal for this project in Year 2 is to acquire prototyped equipment to create the wool pellets and direct the study at the CSU Research Farm to determine product efficacy for soil water retention and additional soil benefits. This study will closely monitor irrigation levels, soil moisture, wool pellet application rates, and other variables to determine if wool pellets will be a viable product for local producers to reduce irrigation rates in their operations.




